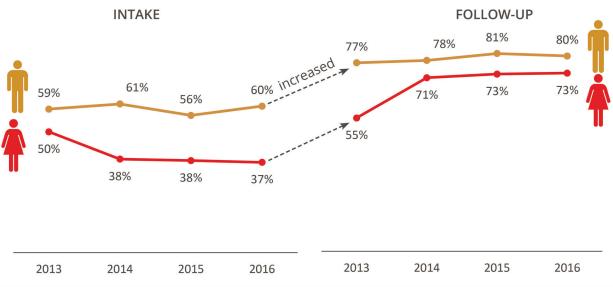


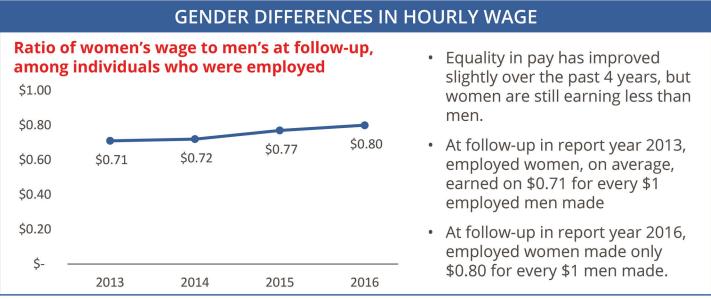
Trends in Gender Differences in Employment

Employment is an important component of recovery as it provides structure, a stable source of income, allows an individual to feel like a productive member of society and has been found to be significantly related to treatment retention.¹ However, compared to men, women tend to be underemployed.

Employment Trends

- For the past 3 years at intake, less than 40% of female clients reported being employed (part- or full-time) compared to at least 60% of male clients.
- For the past 3 years at follow-up, the gap between men and women narrowed with over three-quarters of men reported being employed in any year compared almost that for women.
- There is a significant improvement for women in report year 2016 compared to findings from the 2013 report, however, the number of women who reported being employed at either point, however, was considerably lower than for men.
